FOOD BASKET PRICE MONTHLY May 2019

Highlights

- Food and non-alcoholic beverage inflation declined from 3.1% to 2.9% during April 2019 year-on-year (y-o-y), with Headline inflation declining to 4.4% from 4.5%.
 - The main drivers for Headline inflation were alcoholic beverages and tobacco, transport (fuel costs) and recreation and culture items.
- Vegetable and fruit price inflation were the highest food inflation contributors again with 10.1% and 6.4%, respectively, with meat price inflation 1.2% lower (y-o-y).
- During May 2019, 93ULP fuel prices increased from R15.96/ℓ to R16.49/ℓ (+53c/ℓ), 95ULP fuel prices increased from R16.13/ℓ to R16.67/ℓ (+54c/ℓ) (m-o-m), with Diesel 500ppm increasing from R14.87/ℓ to R14.89/ℓ (2c/ℓ).
 - For petrol, the Rand's weakness was mostly a counterpart of oil's retreat, pointing to a 7c/l reduction at month end. Diesel fared worse, with a slight increase of 12c/l on the cards, with illuminating paraffin showing a 9c rise.
 - For June 2019 fuel prices are predicted to decrease by 20c/l for petrol, with diesel expected to increase by 13c/l. The Carbon Tax will add 9c/l to petrol and 10c/l to diesel, taking effect June 5th.
- During April 2019, the nominal cost of the NAMC's 28-item urban food basket amounted to R879.38 compared to the R883.16 reported during March 2019, resulting in a monthly percentage decline of 0.4%. When compared to April 2018, an annual (y-o-y) percentage increase of 2.5% was reported.

1. Introduction

The NAMC monitors food prices at retail level and releases regular authoritative reports. The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries (DAFF) established the Food Price Monitoring Committee (FPMC) at the NAMC to track and report food price trends in South Africa; to provide explanations of the observed trends and to then advise the department on any possible action that could be taken should national and household food security be threatened. The FPMC was established after the high food price episode of 2000/01 season. The functions of the FPMC were continued by the NAMC after the FPMC completed its work in August 2004. The NAMC issues four quarterly Food Price Monitoring Reports annually and, since 2005, also publishes an annual Food Cost Review, which documents the margins between farm and retail prices of the major food products, amongst other topics. In 2015, the NAMC began releasing a quarterly Farm-to-Retail-Price-Spread (FTRPS) publication, which seeks to provide more insight into the factors driving commodity and food price margins. This publication, the Food Basket Price Monthly Report, came as a result of discussions with industry to keep a more frequent watch on the movements of food prices.

2. Overall inflation and food inflation




Figure 1: Headline CPI and food and non-alcoholic beverage CPI

The April 2019 Consumer Price Index (CPI) released by Statistics South Africa (Stats SA) indicated that the headline CPI and the food and non-alcoholic beverage price indices increased (y-o-y) with 4.4% and 2.9%, respectively, from 4.5% and 3.1% reported during March 2019. **Figure 1** show the trends in the headline CPI and food and non-alcoholic beverage inflation rates on a monthly basis, from January 2012 to April 2019.

3. Comparison between urban and rural prices: April 2019

Table 1 compares prices of selected food items in rural and urban areas for April 2019. The food items which showed the largest price differences between urban and rural areas in April 2019 were: sunflower oil (750ml) at a difference of R4.33, Ceylon/black tea (62.5g) at R3.30 difference, and special maize meal (2.5kg) at a difference of R1.58. This indicates that urban consumers paid more for some of these food

items than their rural counterparts. In other cases, however, rural consumers paid more for certain products (peanut butter (400g), white sugar (2.5kg) and full cream long life milk (1l)), than their urban counterparts.

4. The NAMC food basket

This section analyses the nominal cost of a basic 28-item NAMC urban food basket, based on average food price data for the April 2019 vs. April 2018. Composition of the current food basket (as revised in 2017) include: apples (per kg), baked beans – tinned (410g), bananas fresh (per kg), beans – dried (500g), beef mince fresh (per kg), beef offal fresh (per kg), cabbage (per kg), Ceylon/black tea (250g), cheddar cheese (per kg), chicken giblets (per kg), eggs (1.5 dozen), fish (excl. tuna) – tinned (400g), full cream milk – long life (1ℓ), instant coffee (250g), IQF chicken portions (2kg), a loaf of brown bread (700g), a loaf of white bread (700g), margarine brick (500g), onions fresh (per kg), oranges (per kg), peanut butter (400g), polony (per kg), potatoes fresh (per kg), rice (2kg), sugar white (2.5kg), sunflower oil (750mℓ), super maize meal (5kg) and tomatoes fresh (per kg).

During April 2019, the nominal cost of the NAMC's 28-item urban food basket amounted to **R879.38** compared to the **R883.16** reported during March 2019, resulting in a monthly percentage decrease of 0.4%. When compared to April 2018, an annual (y-o-y) percentage increase of 2.5% was reported.

The 28-item NAMC urban food basket products (in nominal terms) are highlighted in **Table 2.** Products exceeding the South African Reserve Bank's (SARB) upper annual inflation band of 6%, include the following: baked beans - tinned 410g (6.8%), apples – fresh per kg (9.9%), bananas – fresh per kg (10.1%), polony per kg (15.7%), loaf of brown bread 700g (9.5%), loaf of white bread 700g (6.1%), cabbage – fresh per kg (33.5%), and tomatoes – fresh per kg (38.5%).




Figure 2: Nominal cost growth of specific food groups within the NAMC's 28-item food basket, comparing April 2019 vs. April 2018 and April 2019 vs. March 2019

To further explore the impact of inflation on consumers, **Figure 2** presents an illustration of the average nominal cost growth of specific food groups within the NAMC's 28-item food basket, comparing the periods April 2019 vs. April 2018 (y-o-y) and April 2019 vs. March 2019 (m-o-m). All food categories in this 28-item food basket experienced increased annual inflation with the exception of Dairy & Eggs.
