



The Innovation for Policy Process (i4policy)


is an iterative framework for policy reform that optimizes public policy by elevating the knowledge and preferences of policy users, analysts and policy makers through deliberation, expert review, and inclusive participation.

Policy developed through this process is more relevant, legitimate, effective, and generates knowledge in the process of design and delivery that informs future reform.


6-Step Design Thinking Process

Innovation for Policy Process (v4.0)

Agenda Setting

The phase in which issues are recognized as public concerns and seriously debated by politically-relevant actors. Common interests are understood and formed, specific problem statements are defined, weighed and prioritised to establish a user-centered agenda for reform.

Drafting

Potential solutions are explored and developed into concrete proposals and policy instruments (laws, strategies, policies, visions, etc). Draft policy proposals are then reviewed by experts and users, with iterative feedback loops of further ideation, design, review and consultation.

Decision-Making

Policies are proposed and agreed through appropriate decision-making processes.

Implementation

Evaluations are conducted throughout implementation to inform policy delivery against the policy's goals, in service of policy iteration.



Following the passage of the law, the coalition continued into implementation phase, a fourth version of implementation decrees were submitted to Cabinet in March 2021. Additional processes were initiated by the community, such as a national youth debate launched nationwide in August 2020.

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Recommendations

Adopt a participatory approach

- Offers improved beneficiary targeting and service delivery
- Provides a clear picture of the entrepreneurial ecosystem
- Increases social capital, ownership and accountability
- Deliberation shifts social norms and improves trust
- Leverages dialogue to iterate, adapt and refine the law
- Strengthens existing public-private dialogue forums

Laws should recognize ecosystems, be holistic, long-term and address the framework conditions for growth

- Ensure that policy measures are aligned to existing programs and reforms, and that implementing agencies are coordinated.
- Have holistic but realistic, long-term goals. The "best" entrepreneurship ecosystems
 have taken decades to develop and used legislation to sustain the political commitment
 toward entrepreneurship beyond current trends.

Adopt clear and rational policy and beneficiary targeting and avoid discretionary selection of beneficiaries

Ensure the quality of execution and implementation

Embed Monitoring & Evaluation into the law to ensure learning and iteration

Acknowledge the limits of the policy (when necessary), and mitigate potential adverse impacts

- Public policy still cannot solve every obstacle
- Policies can fail to produce positive effects, not by flaws in policy design, but rather due to structural limitations
